

Rail bosses knew there would be a fiasco – but didn't care

o that you didn't have to, I spent Thursday reading the Glaister report into the summe timetable fiasco on Northern Rail and Thameslink. And the deeper I delved, the more despondent I became about Britain's railways The headline conclusion of the inquiry by Professor Stephen Glaister chairman of the Office of Rail and Road (ORR) was that "nobody took charge", disrupting the lives of millions of commuters. But closer inspection reveals a storvline absurd even by pantomime standards. Where's the next train to Luton? "Behind you!" For while hundreds of timetabled trains were cancelled each day extra services would sometimes appear – without waiting passengers being told. "Trains were run without prior notice, information about intermediate stations or [the] platform they would be going from." notes the report. Not surprisingly, many of thes ghost trains ran half-empty
